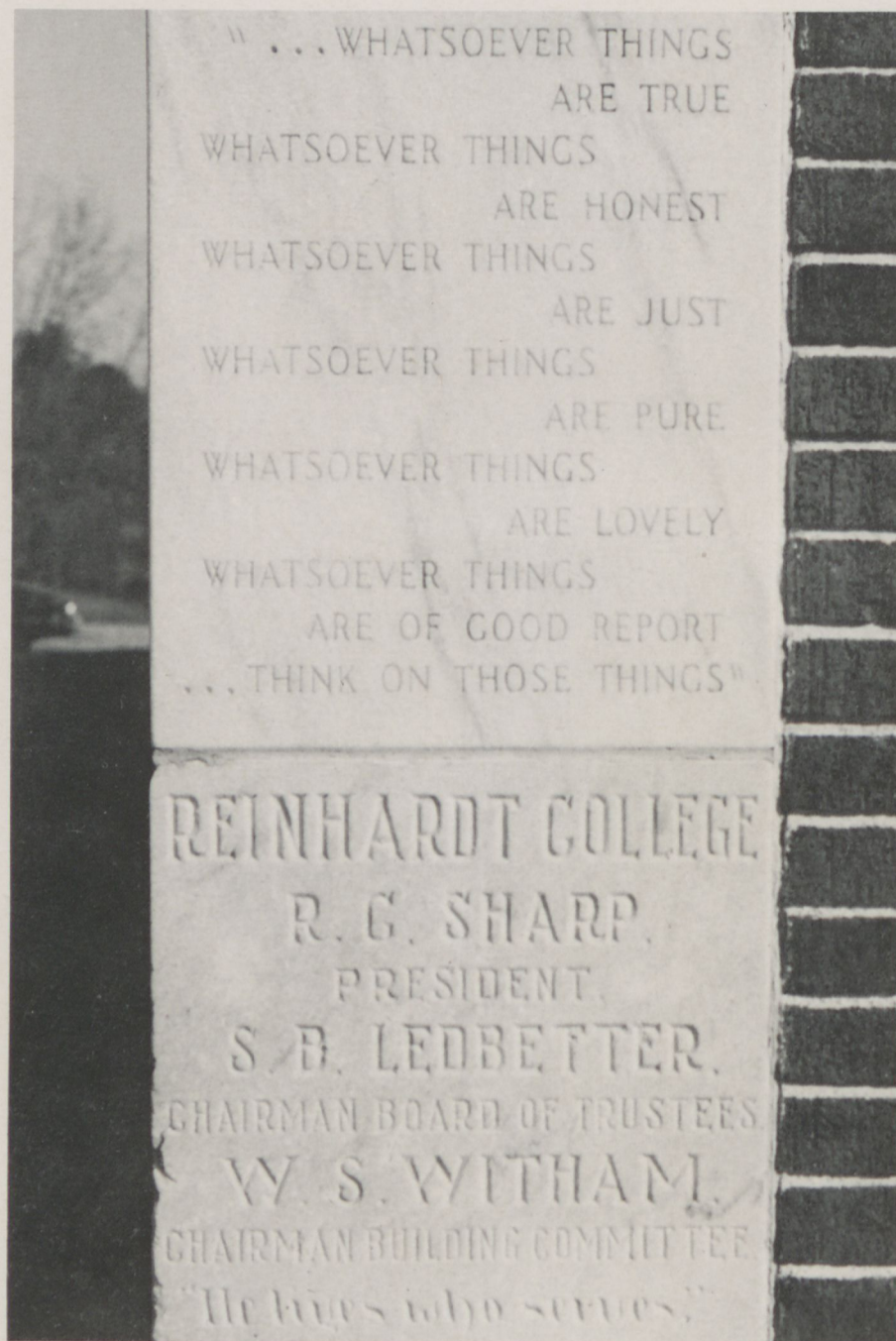

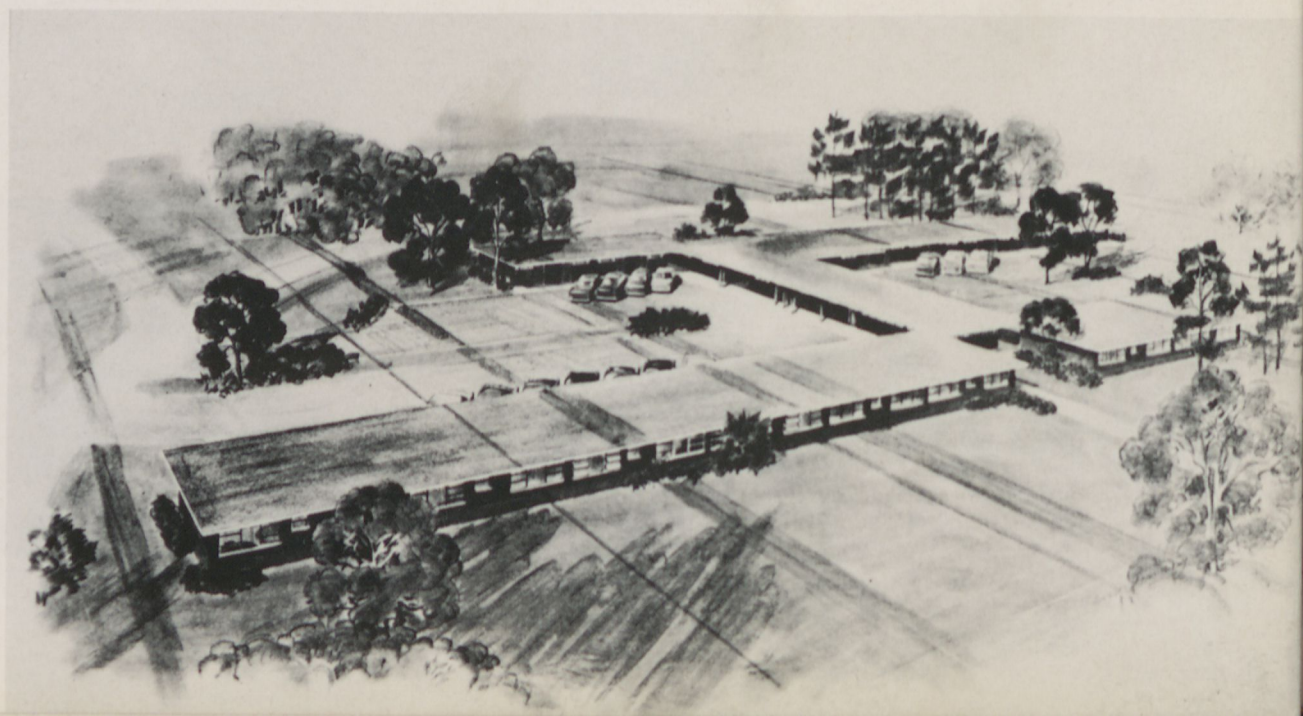

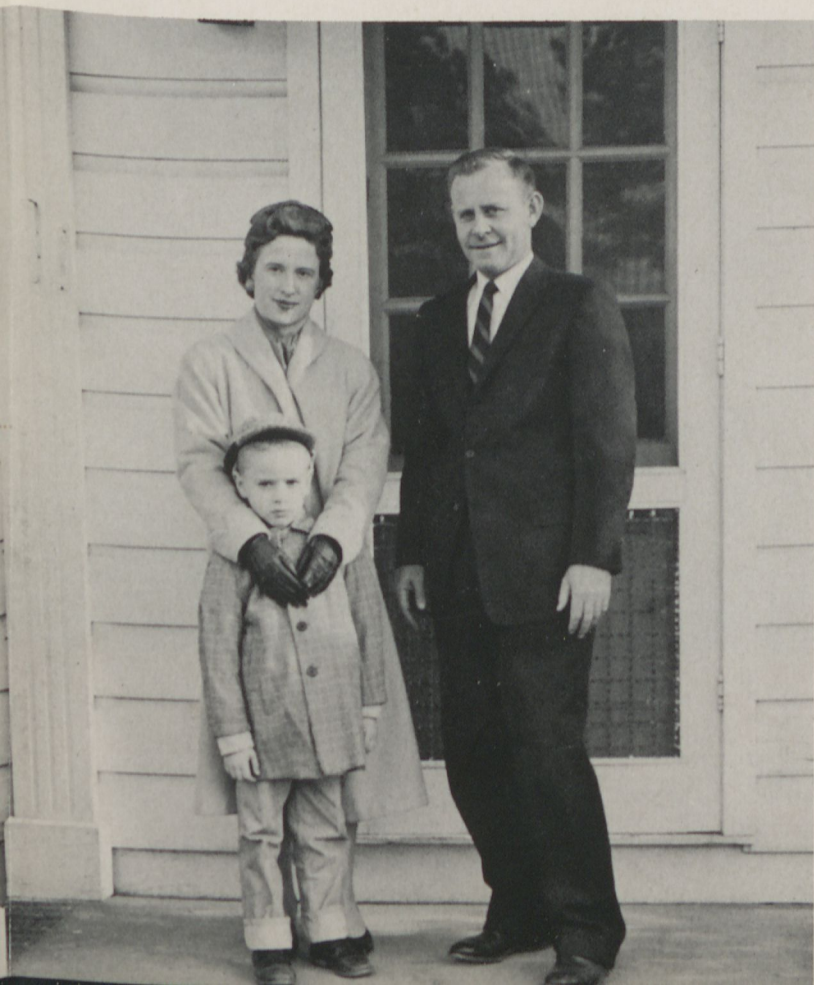

President J. R. Burgess, Jr.



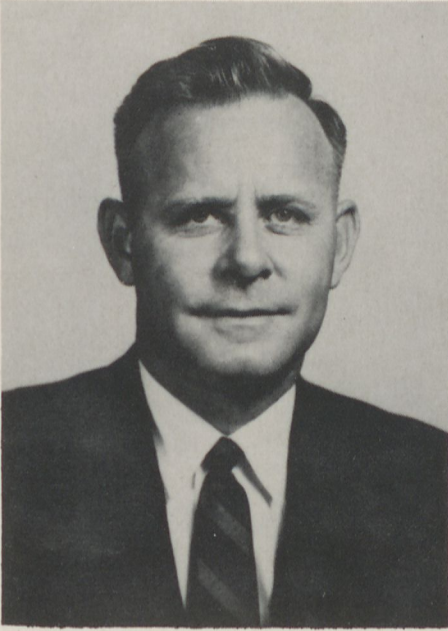
Mrs. Burgess, Jim, Martha, and Mr. Burgess

In July 1944, Mr. Burgess became the President of Reinhardt, which at that time had only sixteen students in college. The six teachers here then were making less than \$150 a month. There was no refrigerator on campus, no commercial department and no business manager; the Dobbs Building was not wired nor in use; the old Administration Building, though condemned, was still being used; the farm was in need of attention; the streets were not paved; the campus was not landscaped; the college was not accredited, and many other things, too numerous to mention, needed to be done. Soon, under Mr. Burgess' leadership, however, things began to happen.

Today Reinhardt has 250 students, twenty-seven faculty and staff members, and a beautiful administration building and two new dormitories, impressive because of their beauty and comfort. Thus, the Lord has continued to bless Reinhardt materially and spiritually during Mr. Burgess' time as president.

Mr. Burgess has several hobbies, among which are listening to good music, playing ping pong, watching television, planting shrubs and trees, and working with students. He himself has planted more than a hundred shrubs and trees on campus. He and his co-workers have helped hundreds of students find a better way of life. The CHEROKEE PHOENIX hereby nominates Mr. Burgess to the "Hall of Fame."

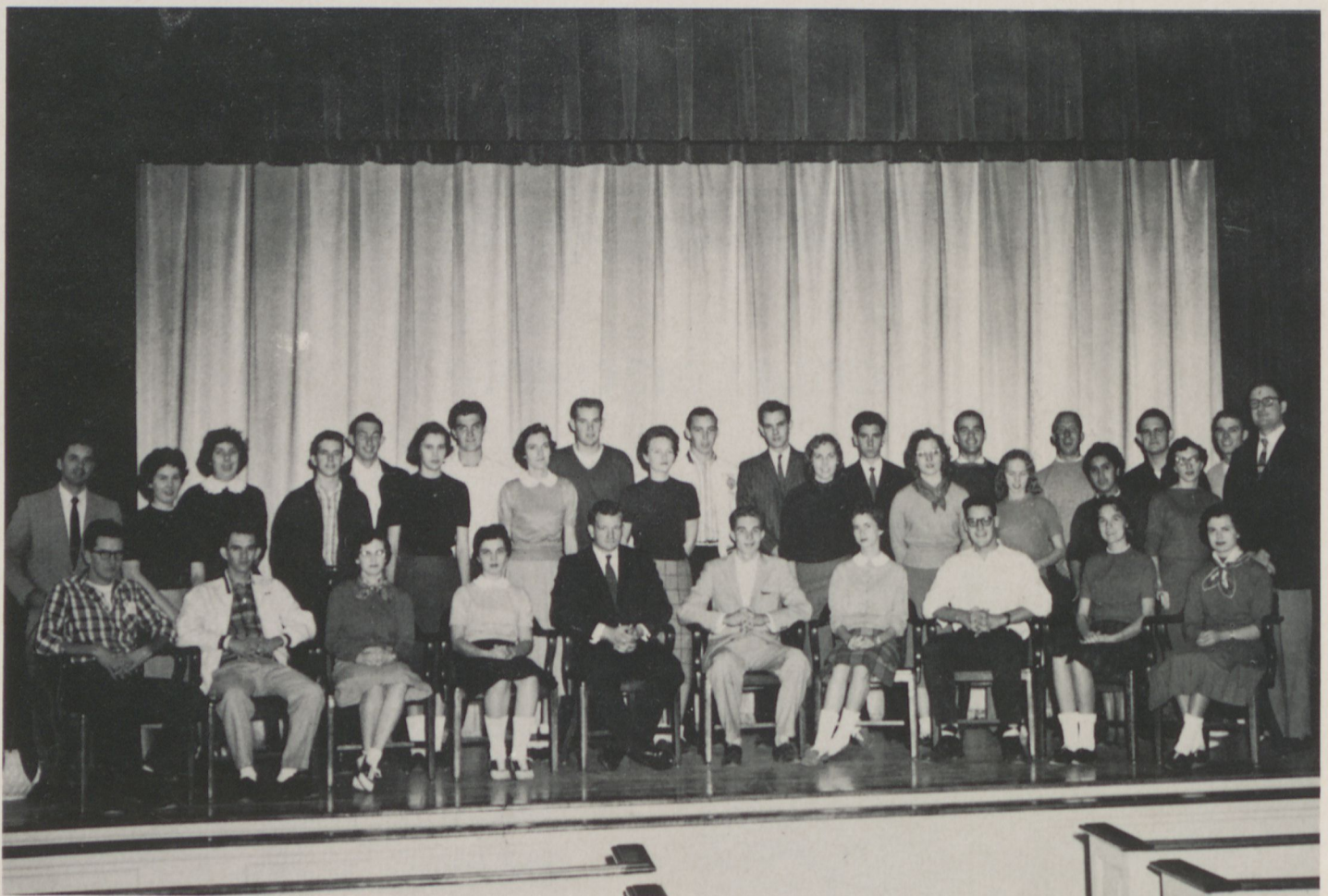
